Travel/Study Program. "Africa touches something essential in the spirit," explains Briggs. A psychological anthropologist, Briggs founded a film com-



pany before starting her travel company, Explore, which seeks out "authenticity, remote natural beauty and luxury without ostentation." That may mean dining with candelabra in the middle of a salt pan, or showering in the desert with the Southern Cross above and lions calling in the distance. Explore is also devoted to conservation-part of some trips' price is earmarked for preserving wildlife and indigenous culture—and education. Trips feature such experts as Alec Campbell, who has spent thirty years mapping rock art in the Kalahari. Itineraries include Namibia, Botswana, South Africa, Zimbabwe and Zambia; Briggs is now developing trips in Australia and Tibet. Africa, of course, will continue.
